Councils could save £5m with new merging proposals

SAVINGS of £5m over a decade could be made if two district councils in southern Oxfordshire formed a link with other local authorities, it is claimed.

South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse district councils are proposing to join with Hart District Council and Havant Borough Council in Hampshire, and Mendip District Council in Somerset. The five councils could then ask an external organisation to provide human resources, internal IT support and accountancy services.

two councils are now asking oers of the public what they think the proposal to join up with the

SODC's Conservative leader John Cotton said: "This is all about making sure residents get the same high-quality service from a lower council tax.
"I believe it's important to look at external options, but I want to hear what residents think."

The Vale's Conservative council leader Matthew Barber said: "We have put a lot of good work in over the last few years to get the Vale in a good financial position so we can protect our frontline services. "This is no time to rest on our laurels, so we are facing up to difficult future challenges now."

He added: "Hopefully, our residents will agree this is the right course of action, but we're keen to hear what they think."
